
How can we map and represent border areas in their complexity and transitory nature? How can we integrate critical and technical dimensions in the production of knowledge frameworks that support policy design and cross-border cooperation tools?

The seminar "Re-Mapping Borderlands" invites a collective reflection on these issues. fostering a dialogue between theoretical perspectives rooted in critical cartography and operational and technical approaches that intertwine descriptive, interpretative, and imaginative dimensions. Through contributions from international guests and experts, the seminar will delve into the maps-power-action nexus, examining cartographic representations both as tools for shaping knowledge and

governance of cross-border territories and as performative practices that claim possibilities for intervention in contested and frontier spaces.

The event's primary objective is to encourage a **shared reflection** on the potential of cartographic representations as instruments of resistance, imagination, and concrete action.

### **Topological Atlas** by Nishat Awan

Nishat Awan's research focuses on the intersection of geopolitics and space, including questions related to diasporas, migration and border regimes. She is interested in modes of spatial representation, particularly in relation to the digital and the limits of witnessing as a form of ethical engagement with distant places. Her book, Diasporic Agencies (Routledge, 2016) addressed the subject of how architecture and urbanism can respond to the consequences of increasing migration. She has also addressed alternative modes of architectural production in the co-authored book Spatial Agency (Routledge, 2011) and the coedited book Trans-Local-Act (aaapepray, 2011). Her work has been exhibited at Nieuwe Instituut, Istanbul Biennale, Busan Museum of Modern Art and Yorkshire Sculpture Park, amongst others. She is currently working on

two book projects that are the result of the long-term project, Topological Atlas. She is Professor of Architecture and Visual Culture at UCL Urban Lab.





### Question the (digital) mapping hype by Aubrey Toldi

#COMMUNITY PLANNING #DIGITAL PRACTICES AND PRESENCES #COLLECTIVE MAPPING

Aubrey Toldi is an American linguist and planner, currently working as a post doc researcher and adjunct professor in the Department of Architecture and Urban Studies (DAStU) at Politecnico di Milano. Before joining Polimi, she was a 2019-2020 Fulbright Research grantee hosted by the University of Catania, exploring how webbased community mapping is actually used in planning practice alongside a community with a strong history of participatory processes. In May 2024, she obtained her PhD in Urban Planning, Design, and Policy from Politecnico di Milano, Her thesis further reflected on how digital practices and presences are presently shaping collective mapping processes. Pushing back on the tendency to cast 'digital' is an empty signifier in collective mapping approaches, her research outlined some of the

ways (how) and places (where) community work is currently struggling for interpretation by, with, and through digital mediums.

At present, she is involved in the action-research project '(E) Welfare in the City.' Her current research focuses on how national programs, such as Italy's National Recovery and Resilience Plan (PNRR), can respond to specific needs of vulnerable groups in diverse urban settings; and the capacity that physical spaces (namely social infrastructure) can play in mitigating digital disparities.

### Narrating the World by Luigi Farrauto


**#CARTOGRAPHY #WAYFINDING #WRITING** 

Luigi Farrauto (1981) has a Degree in Graphic Design (2000-05) with a thesis about wayfinding and holds a PhD in Design from Politecnico di Milano (2010-12), with a thesis focused on cartography. Luigi served as Wayfinding Project Manager for Expo Milano 2015 and has gained valuable experience living and working in various cities, including Amsterdam (as a Wayfinding Designer at Mijksenaar, 2005-07), Boston (as a Visiting Researcher at MIT Senseable City Lab, 2011), and Doha (as a Wayfinding Project Manager for Hamad International Airport, 2015-17), consistently emphasizing the connection between maps and territory. Back in Milan, in 2018, he cofounded with Andrea Novali 100km studio, the first Italian design studio specializing in maps and wayfinding. In 2023, Luigi continued this journey

independently, blending graphic design with geography and travel writing. He has been a visiting lecturer at several Italian design universities, and currently teaches Information Design at ISIA in Urbino. Since 2013, Luigi has been an author for Lonely Planet Italia, has written over a dozen travel guides and two novels, "Senza passare per Baghdad" (Voland, 2011) and "Geografia di un viaggiatore pavido" (Laterza, 2023).
